MAPLE SYRUP DAYS - "IT'S A FESTIVAL" Contribute by Sarah Beener & Doug Burchett

As I drive up the gravel hill east of New Virginia and see the milk jugs hanging in the trees, I am reminded that winter is deciding to leave and that spring is coming! The hanging jugs take me back to memories from reading the Laura Ingalls Wilder's Little House on the Prairie series and Laura describing being a child in absolute excitement over her family's having a festival gathering, gathering sap, and making Maple Syrup and their enjoyment of the home-made syrup and candies. Having seen the jugs for years along my route home sparked my curiosity, and in talk amongst neighbors, I was able to learn more about this fascinating venture from Doug Burchett. I time traveled back to 1999 with Doug as he explained it all started for him with a conversation between brothers while enjoying some \$8 pure maple syrup at breakfast. Doug thinks, how hard can it be to make this? After a little bit of research, reading the book, *Backyard Sugarin'* by Rink Mann and some resourcefulness, Doug was ready to take on the challenge and started making Maple Syrup right in his backyard.

Probably the most important step in syrup making is to identify the correct trees! Sugar maples have about 3% sugar content in their sap and take about 33 gallons of sap to make a gallon of syrup. Soft maples have about 2% sugar content and therefore require 45-50 gallons of sap to produce a gallon of syrup. There are other trees that produce sap. Doug experimented with walnut sap once, which has a reputation of being the "princess of syrups." He got about a gallon of sap, and after he boiled it down, he had enough for one pancake, and he didn't find the flavor much different from that of the prosperous producing soft maples. He also once attempted tapping a boxelder tree, the maple's cousin, and never got a drop of sap.

Starting mid to late January and going until the start of April is "sap season." Mother Nature really has control of the start of the sap flow. Sap is created by the thaw process, and as winter ends and the tree cells start to thaw, it creates the liquid sap. The sap runs up the tree trunk and then can be tapped and collected. About the time the days are starting to warm up to the 40's – 50's and the nights are still below freezing is when the sap flows best, sometimes producing up to two gallons a day. When the temperature spikes into the high 60's – 70's, it hinders and slows the flow and can cause other issues with the sap spoiling. The

earliest Doug has ever cooked was January 19th and has had seasons that went well into the first weeks of April. Either until the sap quits running because of increased temperatures, or when the trees start budding out, the sap may still be running, but it seems to interfere with flavor. The process for extracting the sap from the tree is known as "tapping." Doug uses a homemade 3-inch long and ¼-inch diameter copper pipe that is lightly hammered or "tapped" into a drilled hole about 1½ inches into the good wood of the tree's trunk. The taps can be several feet up the trunk, about shoulder height. It is important to be mindful of positioning your taps for optimal flow. The sun speeds up the thawing process, so you will get better runs from the southeast to southwest sides of the trunk. You will want to place your tap over a large root or below a healthy limb, as this is where a lot of the sap will be flowing. You cut a slit into the top, just above the handle of a clean milk jug and stick the end of the copper pipe into that slit on the jug, and the tree and Mother Nature do the rest.

Depending on the season and how much sap is collected, Doug cooks once or twice a year. He collects the sap as the jugs fill and stores it into large rubber garbage cans until he has enough to cook. He starts cooking when he gets at least 60-90 gallons, which produces about two gallons of syrup.

Now to the fun part, cooking the syrup! The first cooker Doug used was an old witch's cauldron that had previously been used as a flowerpot. After cleaning it all up, the first batch was cooked up. He started out with two trees, and the cooking process took about 12 hours outside in the cauldron and another four hours boiling it down further inside on the stove top.

The next year, Doug looked for a more efficient way to cook. He had an old pressure tank he used to hand-build into a cooker, also called an evaporator. He has built several cookers over the years and currently cooks out of his fifth one, also known as the "Benford 2000." One of the past cookers included three big lasagna pans he found at the sale held at the old New Virginia schoolhouse. The three pans perfectly fit side by side in the top of the tank. The endcap has a fire box area to feed the cooker with wood. Wood from broken down pallets burns hot and seems to work best. One of the first years using this "cooker," it was so hot it melted the Chapstick in his pocket while he cooked. He has made improvements to his

evaporator along the way. It is now insulated, and the cooking process takes about 12 hours. The hotter the cooker is, the faster the syrup cooks down. The sap starts out with very high-water content, and as you cook it, the moisture evaporates, and you boil it down to the thick consistency of syrup.

Standing around 12 hours cooking syrup outside would be a long and boring task alone. Therefore, why not turn this into a "festival" for entertainment during the cooking process? The "Syrup Festival" is described as mostly old men rocking in wooden rocking chairs (that Doug hand makes!), sharing stories and entertaining him while the syrup cooks. In the past, he has kidded with neighborhood kids by inviting them to the "festival" that starts at 5 a.m., only to have them show up to see a couple of guys telling stories and cooking syrup, leaving the kids a little bewildered on where the "festival" is. Friends and neighbors have come throughout the years, and the event recruits great help, like Joe Stuart who has helped with cooking all these long hours. There have been up to 25 people come and enjoy the festival. These people bring treats and stories to share, all while learning about the syrup making process.

Doug has also taught others and held "Seminars" over the years to share his knowledge and experiences. He has had several mentees including Art Daniels, Gary Hutchison and Maurice Herold. He has even had guest speakers, such as old-time friend, Pat Acton (Matchstick Marvels) from Gladbrook, Iowa, attend the fun. Doug laughs and jokes about the memories made over the years, all in good fun!

One of the local favorites from the end-product includes Maple Coffee, which is just instant coffee mixed to taste and sweetened with the maple syrup. Some people come just for this sweet treat alone! Most come for the memories, learning the skill and combining old and new ways of harvesting resources we have right here in our backyards. "Backyard Sugarin'," as they call it, is not only a delicious commodity, but it also creates interesting friendships and brings people together.


Currently for this season, Doug has around 28 taps going, all on soft maple, and has collected 15 gallons of sap so far this year. Later this day, I got a text confirming two more gallons were added!







Special Council Meeting Minutes February 28th, 2022

The Council met in special session on Monday February 28th at 7:00 p.m. to discuss the 2022-23 New Virginia City Budget, ordinance amendment and other agenda items.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Huston with Council Members Galivan, Strange, Taylor and Truman present. Absent Nelson.

A proposed agreement with One Billing Solutions for fire services billing was reviewed and discussed. This is the same company that was recently approved to do ambulance billing for the Fire Department. Galivan moved, seconded by Taylor to approve One Billing Solutions Agreement for fire services billing. A roll call vote was taken: 4 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried.

A letter to the City Council regarding the gas station building was reviewed. The City is not interested in a co-op venture to purchase the gas station building. Southern Iowa Council of Governments (SICOG) will be contacted about grants for small businesses. Information obtained from SICOG will be forwarded to the party interested in the gas station building.

A public hearing was held for the second reading of Ordinance #114 – AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF NEW VIRGINIA, IOWA BY AMENDING PROVISIONS PERTAINING TO WATER RATES. With no citizens present to approve or disapprove and no written or email responses regarding said Ordinance, Strange moved, seconded by Truman to close the public hearing. A roll call vote was taken: 4 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried.

Truman moved, seconded by Taylor to approve the second reading of Ordinance #114 - ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF NEW VIRGINIA, IOWA BY AMENDING PROVISIONS PERTAINING TO WATER RATES. A roll call vote was taken: 4 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried. The third reading of Ordinance #114 will be held at the March council meeting March 7th, 2022 at 7:00 p.m.

A public hearing was held to pass & approve Resolution #2022-03 – A RESOLUTION APPROVING FY23 MAXIMUM PROPERTY TAX DOLLARS. With no citizens present to approve or disapprove and no written or email responses regarding said Ordinance, Strange moved, seconded by Truman to close the public hearing. A roll call vote was taken: 4 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried.

Truman moved, seconded by Strange to pass & approve Resolution #2022-03 - A RESOLUTION APPROVING FY23 MAXIMUM PROPERTY TAX DOLLARS. A roll call vote was taken: 4 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried.

Mike Bethards inquired when he could start tearing out the basketball court in Lions Park. It was consensus of the Council that work could begin on tearing out the basketball court

after the school spring break which ends March 20th, 2022.

The Fire Department has been approached by citizens to do controlled grass fires. It was the consensus of the Council if members of the Fire Department want to do controlled burns it will have to be done with their own personal equipment and that no Fire Department equipment will be used.

There has been a truck located in Minnesota that could possibly work for a second out grass truck. It is a 2014 Chevrolet Silverado 2500HD work truck -6.0 liter V8 6 speed automatic 4WD. Strange moved, seconded by Truman to approve a price range of \$20,000 to \$25,000 and to approve taking a check for the truck if the truck is acceptable after test driving and thoroughly inspecting it inside and out including the engine compartment and underside. A roll call vote was taken: 4 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried.

With no further business to come forth, Taylor moved, seconded by Galivan to adjourn meeting. A roll call vote was taken: 4 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried. The meeting adjourned at 7:50 p.m. The March council meeting is scheduled for Monday March 7th, 2022 at 7:00 p.m.

<u>Old business discussed</u>: The Council discussed the possibility of asphalting South Street and Maple Street. Closing alleys not in use was also discussed.

<u>**Citizen Input:**</u> There has been citizen complaints about unlicensed and/or junk vehicles in the 400 block of East Street. There are two cars and a tow truck located on the property. An official letter from the City will be sent to the property owner regarding the vehicles.

There has been citizen complaints about dogs running loose on Main Street south of Broadway causing problems with citizens walking their dogs and in general being aggressive. Official letters from the City will be sent to the owners of the dogs citing pertinent Ordinance sections regarding dogs running at large and being aggressive.


Critter Corner

Euthanasia

In order to be capable livestock and equine owners, one must always ensure that an animals' quality of life is up to par. Maintaining the welfare of any animal should always be a primary obligation. With this in mind, there are instances where accidents occur or illnesses progress to the point where an animal is not going to get better. Although it's a tough subject to discuss, humane euthanasia ("putting an animal down") is a tool to stop the suffering of an animal. As a veterinarian, I thought it would be wise to give you some of the information needed to make an informed decision on whether an animal needs to be put down or not.

The goal of humane euthanasia is to ensure that an animal is put down painlessly and quick. There are three accepted methods of euthanasia for farm animals. The following are the three methods: gunshot, intravenous injection of euthanasia solution or penetrating captive bolt. As a veterinarian I have carried out all three methods for clients. However, the gunshot method is one that a producer or farmer can use themself if they are properly trained and confident in their ability.

In order to make sure the gunshot method is used correctly, the correct cartridge and the correct anatomical site on the skull must be obeyed. The smallest deviation from either will result in an incorrect destruction of brain tissue. However, if one is using the gunshot method, the safety of the humans involved must always be the most important consideration. I recommend not using anything below the 9 mm in size for larger animals to make sure the correct amount of energy is being used to destroy tissue. The following diagram, courtesy of ISU College of Veterinary Medicine, can be used to find the correct anatomical site on the skull:



ne Euthanasia Procedures For Sick, Injur and/or Debilitated Cattle

Point of Entry of projectile in cattle should be at the intersection of two imaginary lines, each drawn from the outside corner of the eye to the base of the opposite horn. High in the center of the forehead, but Not Between the Eyes!

NOT BETWEEN THE EYES!

If an owner was not wanting the gunshot method to be used on their animal, then a veterinarian can be consulted with to use injectable euthanasia solution. Injectable solution can only be given by a licensed veterinarian. The only caveat to this method is that proper disposal must be obeyed. The carcass must either be incinerated or buried six feet deep at the time of the procedure to prevent other animals from coming into contact with the solution that is present in the carcass.

It's important to consult your veterinarian if you have questions about humane euthanasia because it's an important part of owning animals. Always remember to stay safe yourself and to not do anything yourself if you are not comfortable. Veterinarians are trained to put animals down, so if you are questioning the process at all, always consult your veterinarian.

MAPLE SYRUP BARS

Ingredients:

Base

- 1/2 cup butter, softened
 - ¼ cup brown sugar
- 1 cup flour

Topping

- 1 cup maple syrup
- ¾ cup brown sugar
- ½ cup walnuts, chopped
- ¼ cup butter
- 2 eggs
- 2 tablespoons flour
- pinch of salt

Instructions:

Base

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Combine butter, brown sugar and flour and stir until the mixture is crumbly. Press mixture into an 8 inch greased baking pan. Bake for 10 minutes. Remove and set aside.

Topping

- 1. In a saucepan, combine the maple syrup, brown sugar and walnuts and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and cook over medium-low heat for 5 minutes. Remove from heat and add butter and stir until melted.
- 2. In a bowl, beat the eggs with the flour and salt. Add a little of the hot mixture to the eggs while stirring and then add back to the hot maple syrup mixture and stir to combine. Pour over the base and bake for another 25 to 30 minutes, or until set. Cool completely before cutting.



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

It has always been our goal to make each of our articles encouraging and uplifting to the readers of the Tri-Corner-Express. However, we felt it was necessary to address the tragedy of the loss of life and property that took place along the path of the outbreak of tornadoes on March 5th. Our hearts here at Jesus' Right Hand are heavy with the news of all the death and destruction caused by this. We watched the devastation live on television as it was happening; names and faces immediately came to our mind as we remembered clients, families and friends who were being affected at that very moment. This ministry touches so many families that live outside of the I-35 and tri-county area. As the evening unfolded, it seemed that more and more people we knew were in the path of this destruction. As the storms and tornadoes passed and things began to quiet down, the true magnitude of the situation came into focus. Phone calls and text messages were exchanged to check in on loved ones, and I'm sure there were hugs of relief when friends and family were reunited face-to-face. We saw images of areas and neighborhoods that we knew very well, yet they were areas that were totally beyond recognition. Even now, we are still having difficulty wrapping our mind around all that has happened here in Iowa. We try to come up with explanations that will satisfy the multitude of questions that arise, but we come up empty. We want to thank God that our life or property was spared, but in the face of everyone else's tragedy, survivor's guilt just won't let us utter the words. We struggle for answers, but nothing makes sense. Can we ever come to terms with a tragedy if we never have the answer to the question, "Why?"

On a personal note, sometimes I feel as if people expect that I would have the "God-answers" to all the questions that arise simply because I am a Christian. You know all the questions: "Why would something so tragic happen to such a good person?", "Why me, why now?", "Why weren't they spared?", "Why weren't they healed?", "Where was God during all of this?" My first instinct is to find an answer that would stop the pain, but I know that nothing I could say would take away the pain of their shock and grief. When something horrible happens, it's human nature to want to blame it on someone. We want someone to be held accountable, even though sometimes things just happen. Bad things happen. Sometimes it's because of the choices we make, and sometimes it's because of the choices other people make . . . and sometimes it just happens.

These are times when answers won't satisfy. It makes me feel helpless and vulnerable because I'm the type of person who likes to make things better for people who come into my life. However, I'm just as human as they are, and I don't have all the answers. So, I do the only thing I know to do in that situation. I love them unconditionally just where they are. No judgement. No condemnation. I'll wrap my arms around them if they'll let me, and I will cry with them. I'll listen to their angry rants without silencing them. I'll let them be as human as they need to be so they can release all the pent-up feelings that comes along with tragedy and grief. Even though I may not be able to give them an answer, I can give them my love and compassion and the comfort of my presence. And in the process of being human, I find a peace that passes all understanding. In the Bible, when Job was in the depth of tragedy and suffering, his friends came and sat down on the ground with him for seven nights. No one said a word to him during that time because they saw how much he was suffering (Job 2:12-13). They simply gave him the comfort of their presence. When we are in the deepest place of suffering, sometimes words just have little to no effect. Sometimes we've got to allow God to use us in ways that we may feel like we're not making much of a difference. We just need to "be." No agendas, no plans, just "be."

If there's ever a time when we need to be available to one another, it's now. If you can be a comfort to someone, we encourage you to do so. If you need a listening ear, comfort or prayer, please know that we are here for you at Jesus' Right Hand. Be encouraged knowing you have a purpose and a plan for your life! In His Service & Love.

7. Add the sausage and stir. Pour into the preheated baking dish.


8. Bake until a toothpick inserted into the center of the dish comes out clean, about 25 minutes.
